

Dear Residents, When I agreed to write a contribution for this issue, the Coronavirus had just arrived, and the implications on our community

had hardly begun to unravel. Obviously, all of us at the Parish Council extend our heartfelt best wishes to all our residents, and add our sincere thanks to the many in the NHS, Social Care, retailing and other services on whom we rely. Even though the country is past the worst of the outbreak, it seems likely that some restrictions and changes will remain for a considerable time.

The greatest practical change has been the inability to conduct our regular public meetings, or the Annual Electors' Meeting and councillor elections. The government suspended all of these, but we will return to normal public meetings just as soon as we are allowed to. At the beginning of June, we held our first 'Virtual' meeting, online through Zoom, and we hope to hold future meetings online this way until face-to-face meetings are possible again. Residents will be able to 'attend' as virtual visitors to our online meetings, just as they might come to our monthly meetings in Heelands.

Sadly, the lockdown also meant we could not have our Parish Magazine printed and distributed this time, but you've probably discovered an online version is available on our website and Facebook pages, Please don't forget to tell your family and friends about the online versions.

It is particularly disappointing that the Covid-19 outbreak has prevented events to commemorate the 75th anniversary of VE Day, and the end of the Second World War in Europe. There are still a number of online events to mark the anniversary, and it seems likely that some celebrations will be carried over to next year, when they can also mark the end of the war in the Far East.

MK Reader Service Could you read to someone who is sight-impaired?

Do you like reading and/or shopping? Do you have a couple of hours a week to spare? If so, there is the perfect opportunity for you to make new friends and do some worthwhile voluntary work via the Milton Keynes Reader Service. Many of us are unaware of the difficulties such relatively basic tasks as managing mail and shopping pose to those with a visual impairment, let alone the attendant transport issues. How do you choose greetings cards or the correct sized clothing or even the preferred brands of food items?

MKRS has been training and introducing volunteers to service users for 30 years and has generated many long-standing friendships along the way. Take Shirley, who uses our service and greatly looks forward to her weekly visits from Helen. Helen talks Shirley through all her correspondence and assists her where necessary. Over the past 12 months, the pair have become firm friends. Shirley says, 'Since losing my husband, Helen has been an absolute life-line. She visits me every week and deals with all my reading material. We also manage a bit of a chat too which

means we have built up a lovely friendship over the months. She has helped me retain a level of independence which would have been otherwise impossible'.

Volunteering could mean playing Scrabble, doing crosswords, or reading books, magazines or newspapers. Going to the theatre, museums, art galleries and even live opera screenings at local cinemas. Shopping could involve a trip to a supermarket or to the main MK Centre. There are regular coffee mornings to meet up with other volunteers and service users. Tracy Harrold, the charity's coordinator says, 'We are really keen put people in touch with each other on a local basis. We offer full training and all expenses are paid by the charity. If you think you could spare some time, we would really love to hear from you. Just an hour a week can make such a difference to our service users.'

Advice: Fraud and Scams

Over the last year or so TVP have seen an escalation of online scams and fraud. All causing great distress to the victims and families involved and some leading to life-changing consequences and emotional distress.

The scams are becoming increasingly sophisticated and any one of us can fall victim regardless of age, background, technology or financial savvy.

The scammers use a number of techniques to pull you in. They are skilled

at building up your trust and using time pressure to encourage you, the victims, to make rash choices under pressure, which you wouldn't do under normal circumstances.

Take Five to Stop Fraud is a national campaign from Financial Fraud Action UK and the Government, backed by the banking industry. It's about taking that moment to pause and think before responding to text, email or phone call. Keep this simple phrase in your mind:

'My money, My info, - I don't think so!'

The PCSO team felt that due to the escalation of this horrible crime and having to deal with one at least every week it would be a good opportunity to put a few steps in place that you may not have already thought of to protect yourself.

Request to move money – A genuine bank or organisation will never contact you and ask for your PIN.

Clicking on links/files – Never click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

Personal information – Question uninvited approaches. Contact the company directly if you want to carry on the conversation. Be wary of the information you post online about yourself.

Passwords – Use random words to make your password strong eg 'catschoolship'

Anti-Virus – Make sure this is up-todate, back up important data regularly using external devices or cloud storage. Use a screen lock.

Bradwell Village Rocks - Covid Snake

The Facebook group, Bradwell Village Rocks, was started just over two years ago, by local resident, Babs Hughes. It was inspired by two of the founders' grandchildren. The group now has over 400 members! One of the members suggested creating a Covid-19 Rock Snake, just to cheer folk up!

Nearby, Ashlynn put some lovely drawings on a tree, near the nature field, it is now known as Ashlynn's tree. Babs thought this would be a good place to start the snake.

The Snake now has over 1000 rocks and is over 300 metres in length. You can find it in the heart of Bradwell Village, along the side of the redway between Abbey Road and the culvert under the railway.

If you fancy decorating rocks, pebbles or stones please feel free to do so and join in. You can use acrylics, Sharpies, emulsion, nail varnish etc. Just coat them once dry with either a







spray varnish, yacht varnish or pva/ water mix. Then take a photo, make a post on the Bradwell Village Rocks Facebook page and add the stone to the end of the snake. You don't need a degree in art, anyone can join in!

The Facebook group has recently run a poll to name the snake. The name Bradders won!

News of the snake has reached the media and has recently featured in MK Citizen and on the radio station, QuarantineFM.

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Historical Snippet - Bradwell

One of the routes I use for my daily walks takes me down into the village. One day I thought to myself, 'some the site before the existing semidetached houses numbered 2/56 were built in the 1870s.



I contacted Dennis, who is also related to the Whitlock family, and he told me that he often visited his relatives on the corner of Abbey Road and Vicarage Road. He remembers, 'When you walked down Vicarage Road 56

was at the

of my Grandma's uncles lived in the village I wonder if the houses they lived in still exist'.

I looked on the 1939 Land Registry and found that Charles and Alice Whitlock lived at 2 Abbey Road and Albert and Amy Whitlock at 56 Vicarage Road and on my next walk went down Primrose Road and along Abbey Road. I knew the house numbers got smaller as I went towards the church but to my surprise the last house in the terrace is number 4. Where was number 2? On rounding the corner, (now in Vicarage Road), the first of the terrace is number 54.

On the corner where Vicarage Road becomes Abbey Road there is a white rendered house. On my next walk I went in the opposite direction and saw that this house has number 56 on it on the Vicarage Road side and on the Abbey Road side the windows are not all the same and there is a front door but no number. So it must be the 2 Abbey Road that I was missing.

A further walk enabled me to work out that 2 Abbey Road has a double bay at the front and a single bay at the back, while 56 Vicarage Road has a single bay on the Abbey Road side and a double bay at the rear.

I've looked at some old maps and there appeared to be an older building on

bottom on the corner. The front door overlooked the corner so that you could see the field and the railway line. There was a low picket fence running round the gardens of both houses. A gate from Vicarage Road led up to the houses, on the left was the front garden of 56 and on the right a lilac bush and a well. At the top of the path on the right was a wooden shed shared by both houses and on the left the two back doors into the kitchens of both houses, Albert's first then Charlie's.

If you continued round into Abbey Road then you could see Albert's bedroom window and a bit further along Charlie's front door. I remember that Uncle Charlie kept canaries in a shed with a wire mesh front in his front garden.'

So the brothers, Albert and Charles Whitlock lived as next door to each other as one could possibly do! Like many in the village they got their water from a well in their garden.

On a later walk I met Eileen from number 56 and she confirmed that the houses are divided internally in an unusual L-shaped fashion.

Charles and Alice died in the 1970s. Albert and Amy Whitlock have a headstone in St Lawrence churchyard on the left just inside the gate.

VE Day Celebrations!

There is rightly a lot in the news currently about VE Day; the day, 75 years ago this month, when Britain and its Allies were able to celebrate Victory in Europe, after overcoming the Nazi regime in Germany in the Second World War. For us, the war had raged since September, 1939, when the Nazis invaded Poland. And whilst war in the Far East continued for several months, the relief we felt as a nation was unprecedented. There was no longer a threat that storm-troopers might invade our nation, and we could begin to put the country back together after all the destruction.

Very few of the people who were alive then are still with us, and as anniversaries pass by, that number will dwindle further. We are fortunate in Bradwell Parish that one of our residents, Betty Williamson, was not only one of the thousands who flocked to London in 1945 to celebrate;



she was captured on film, and the photograph has been used by the Post Office for one of the commemorative stamps. It has also appeared on other memorabilia over

the years. Betty; then Betty Kemp, lived in Tottenham, with her sister Joan and friend, Dolly. In the photograph, Betty is on the right, behind the American flag, and her sister



is at the left. They all took the celebratory free Tube into London's West End to join in the street celebrations, and were in the right place at the right time for the photographer.

Sadly, the Coronavirus lockdown has prevented the many celebrations and events that were planned, and amid the Coronavirus it might be easy to forget altogether about the day in May, 1945, when Britain came to a standstill to celebrate the end of the Nazi regime, and the end of the European war.

Betty is now aged over 90, and lives in Bellfounder House, where there will no doubt be something of a party, despite the lockdown!
